Briefs from Brent

Proverbs 29:18 says, "Where there is no vision, the people perish." At the Southern Baptist Convention in 1978 our SBC president, Jimmy R. Allen reminded us that the opposite is also true by preaching a sermon entitled "Where there is a vision, the people flourish". His sermon preached 47 years ago from a proverb written 3000 years ago is as true today as it was then.

We live in a world that is perishing because it lacks the faith and desire to see and follow God. We are so focused on ourselves that we can only see ourselves and even though we may be floundering in our pursuits we keep following them. Or perhaps worse still, we are following the propaganda of others whose desire is to use us to accomplish their visions of power, and passions, and economic success. It does not matter to them if we perish so long as we help their dreams to flourish. That is the history of mankind. It is a vicious cycle and the only way to stop this centrifugal force is to discover faith in and to follow an eternal and loving God.

That is why Jesus came into our world. Jesus was God himself. He was Emmanuel which means "God with us." The coming of Jesus was God dwelling among us in grace and graciousness. The world into which Jesus was born was every bit as wicked and harsh as ours. It was a world controlled by the powerful who not only had little regard for the weak but who often dealt viciously with the weak. It was an unfair world in which human weaknesses were exploited. Jesus looked at this world and said that the people "were like sheep without a shepherd" which means they were perishing rather than flourishing.

Jesus confronted this world in both word and deed. He spoke truth both in the streets and in the synagogues. When people balked at the truth, He told stories and asked questions that pointed out their sin and caused them to take account of their lives. Jesus found ways to help those who were perishing to flourish. He cast out demons. He healed the sick. He fed the hungry. He was honest with people about their sins, but He did not ostracize them. Rather He called them to repentance and offered them forgiveness. In a world that was full of greed Jesus was sacrificial. Jesus loved everyone, even the worst of sinners. In an act of tremendous love Jesus sacrificed His own life by execution on a cross so that lost and sinful people of all ages could experience life abundant and eternal. Jesus died so that those who were perishing could flourish.

I think that in 2025 we need to grasp a fresh understanding of Jesus and obtain His vision of helping people to flourish.
